

## Shaftesbury's Murdoch Mysteries Honoured with Provincial Heritage Award

In 1967, The Ontario Historical Society (OHS) established an awards program to recognize individuals, organizations, corporations, and authors who have contributed significantly to the preservation and promotion of Ontario's heritage.

The President's Award recognizes an outstanding contribution to heritage conservation or promotion in Ontario's recent past. The Ontario Historical Society is pleased to present the 2017 President's Award to the television series *Murdoch* Mysteries, a production of Shaftesbury, for bringing greater public awareness to Ontario's rich history.

Thomas Craig plays Inspector Brackenreid on the hit show, Murdoch Mysteries. Craig is also known for his recurring roles on the popular British-TV series Coronation Street and Where the Heart Is.

For eleven seasons, Murdoch Mysteries has delighted television audiences with episodes that feature both stories rooted in Ontario's past and heritage locations throughout the province. Murdoch Mysteries season 12 is currently in production. The OHS appreciates how much research and hard work goes into Shaftesbury's production of lively narratives that reflect the values, attitudes, and behaviour of the people of Ontario more than a century ago. With an average weekly viewership of 1.2 million, Murdoch Mysteries is one of Canada's most successful and longestrunning drama series, and has been licensed to broadcasters in 110 countries and territories worldwide to date.

By making extensive use of Ontario heritage sites as filming locations, Murdoch Mysteries has greatly increased public awareness of them. Viewers in Ontario appreciate seeing familiar historical sites and learning about others in their province. Fans from around the globe have come to know something of the richness of Ontario's heritage, and many have visited the province to see places depicted on the show.

Moreover, the behind-the-scenes series, *Making Murdoch*, further promotes appreciation of the heritage landmarks depicted in episodes, and commendably, it invites viewers to get out and visit the province's historical sites. The OHS Honours and Awards Committee is proud to recognize **Shaftesbury's** *Murdoch Mysteries* with the 2017 President's Award. The award was presented at the Annual General Meeting of the Ontario Historical Society at the Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre in Toronto, Ontario.
