#### **Publications**

The OHS Strategic Plan for 2000-2001 identified the mandate for the Society's publications programme: support of the OHS flagship, *Ontario History* and its commitment to the publication of research relating to "Ontario's history, both scholarly and popular"; the regular production of the *OHS Bulletin* as a vehicle of communicating OHS business and activities. The third domain is the production of "a number of popular publications that attract a wide interest in the history of Ontario, the Society and its activities." The latter is the responsibility of the OHS Publications Committee.

One of the principal events in 2001 was the official launch in January of *Celebrating One Thousand years of Ontario's History*, the proceedings of the symposium held in April of the previous year.

While no new OHS publications were initiated in 2001, sales of our existing titles continued apace, generating revenue of over \$8,000. Of the eighteen titles available for sale, the most popular publications are as follows: Celebrating 1000 Years of Ontario's History; Tombstone Tales from Ontario Cemeteries, This Little Piggy Went to the Market and Came Back With a Full Basket.

The Publications Committee has not recommended new ventures until there is a better sense of the Society's financial status. With this resolved several initiatives will be evaluated:

- 1. New publications associated with future OHS workshops or which are proposed by prospective authors.
- 2. The revision and production of two OHS publications that are in demand:

  Directory of Heritage Organizations and Institutions in Ontario and The Eager
  Beaver's Guide to Volunteers.
- 3. Considering the re-issue of publications that are no longer available but continue to be in demand: *Consuming Passions* and *The 1837 Rebellion Remembered*.

Given the steady demand for OHS volumes, it is important that the Publications Brochure continue to be circulated to members to encourage further purchases.

#### Museum Committee

- 2. Working with our colleagues across the Province to promote better partnerships between museums and their local Historical groups, to the benefit of both.

During 2001, the OHS was represented by Gloria Taylor at the Committee to promote an Archaeological Symposium in 2003. The Symposium's purpose is to open a dialogue regarding artifact deposition and hopefully resolve some problems.

# Ontario History

Ontario History, the journal of The Ontario Historical Society enjoyed a very successful year in 2001. It was particularly successful in its financial and related affairs. After having been dropped (for three years) from the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council funding programme in support of scholarly journals *Ontario History* was able to rejoin the competition and was favoured with a successful adjudication! The panel that reviewed the application commented favourably on both the journal's quality and on its plans to expand its accessibility by developing its presence on the Internet. Those who have access to the web and to the Society's website www.ontariohistoricalsociety.ca will know already that the table of contents of several recent issues of the journal are available for perusal and subscriptions to the journal can also be requested online. Future plans include posting the entire Ontario History index (currently available in two volumes) online, possibly in the form of a searchable database. This will be followed with postings of back issues of the journal beginning with long out of print issues of its predecessor, Papers and Records of the Ontario Historical Society. Consideration is also being given to the possibility of posting book reviews on the website so as to make them available in a more timely fashion. Finally in 2001, the Board of Directors of the Society also agreed to renew my appointment as editor and managing editor of the journal and I would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their vote of confidence.

Apart from these successes, the journal also published two well-received issues in 2001. The Spring issue for the year was a special one, guest edited by Dr Cynthia Comacchio and subtitled "Coeds, Collegiates, and Clubs: Educating Young People in Twentieth-Century Ontario." This was a compilation of three articles that focused on aspects of the history of education in the province. The Autumn issue for 2001, through four articles, ranged broadly across Ontario history in both time and subject matter. Two articles in the issue dealt with aspects of women's history (nineteenth and early twentieth century) and two with aspects of industrial history (early twentieth century and early to mid-twentieth century).

The Editorial Advisory Committee for the journal for 2001 was made up of ten members: Linda Ambrose, Jeanne Beck, Nancy Christie, Cynthia Comacchio, Donald Graves, Laurie Leclair, Jan Noel, Carmela Patrias, Ian Radforth, and Randall White. Thank you to all members for their continued contributions. Jim Clemens continued as the journal's book review editor and I would like to take this opportunity to thank him for his dedication to the journal and wonderful effort on its behalf. In addition, this is an important to thank the journal's accomplished and hardworking manuscript editor, Dr Curtis Fahey without whose efforts no issue would appear.

#### Communications

With members in all regions of Ontario, the *OHS Bulletin* continues to be an important medium for our message. The *OHS Bulletin* was published five times in 2001- March, May, July, September and December. Complimentary copies of the Bulletin were sent to a number of politicians and members of the media, helping to raise the profile of the OHS across Ontario.

A brochure and media release was designed for each workshop or event presented by the OHS in 2001. The brochures and media releases were sent to local members, heritage organizations and media across Ontario. New Membership, Publications, Cemetery Defence Fund, and Honours and Awards brochures were also designed in 2001 and sent to members and non-members throughout Ontario, Canada and the World.

# **Educational Programmes**

The Ontario Historical Society began 2001 by launching the book and video Celebrating One Thousand Years of Ontario's History. In February, the OHS and the Old Durham Road Pioneer Cemetery Committee celebrated Black History Month by launching the book Broken Shackles: Old Man Henson - From Slavery to Freedom and the video Speakers for the Dead.

With the support of Canada's National History Society, the OHS co-sponsored the workshop "Everything You Ever Wanted to Know about an Heritage Organization or Institution but Were Afraid to Ask!" with the Simcoe County Historical Association, Réseau du Patrimoine "Voyageur" Heritage Network, and the Peterborough Historical Society. These workshops were held in Minesing, Sheguiandah, and Peterborourgh. In February the OHS participated in "Seedy Saturday" which was sponsored by Black Creek Pioneer Village and Seeds Diversity of Canada.

In the spring of 2001, the OHS in co-operation with the Réseau du Patrimoine "Voyageur" Heritage Network presented a workshop at the West Parry Sound Museum entitled, "Researching Your Local History - Artifacts and Structures."

A slide show and lecture based on the book *Tombstone Tales from Ontario Cemeteries* continued to be very popular and was presented at Halton-Peel Branch of the Ontario Genealogical Society, the Ailsa Craig & District Historical Society, the Newcastle Village & District Historical Society, the Oshawa Historical Society and at Windsor's Community Museum for the exhibit opening of "Gone but not Forgotten: Cemeteries of Essex County."

On May 26-27, 2001, the OHS hosted "Doors Open" in partnership with Heritage Toronto. OHS staff and volunteers conducted historical tours at the John McKenzie House.

Throughout 2001, the OHS participated in various educational activities with the First Nations, heritage groups and descendents to educate the general public in North America and overseas about the issue of public interest and the application to dig up and move the northern half of the burying ground at St. James' Cathedral in Toronto. This culminated in a Vigil on All Souls Day with family members and community heritage groups at St. James' Cathedral.

Representatives of various churches and cemetery boards and over 30 heritage organizations and institutions attended the workshop "The Heritage of Ontario Cemeteries" at the St. John's Anglican Church (Nelson) in Burlington. This workshop was presented by the OHS and Heritage Burlington LACAC.

The OHS presented Young Ontario Programmes at Gulfstream and St. Roberts Public Schools in Toronto. Numerous outreach programmes were held including at Black Creek Pioneer Village, York Mills - Oriole United Church, the Etobicoke Historical Society, the Canadian Royal Heritage Trust, Peel Heritage Complex, the Race Relations Committee for the City of Toronto Police Force and Buxton National Historic Site & Museum.
