

President's Report



will soon be able to report a resolution that both celebrates the memory of Sir Frederick Banting and enhances the activities of the OHS.

I wish to close this report by thanking the OHS Board, Staff, and membership at large for their support over the last year.

Executive Director's Report

2004 was an extremely busy and productive year.

Our Heritage Day celebrations started the year on a very positive note. More than 150 people dropped by to meet Madeleine Meilleur, Minister of Culture, and enjoy the afternoon's festivities that featured music by Café Jazz, food by Eidolon Catering, wine by Joseph's Estate Wines, and costumed re-enactors (Bruce and Carol Whittaker, Timothy Avery & Bill Meakins). The John McKenzie House, freshly painted, courtesy of Benjamin Moore & Co. Ltd. and Community Foundations of Canada, was the perfect backdrop for the occasion. Minister Meilleur brought greetings from Dalton McGuinty, Premier of Ontario, and formally announced the province's investment in the OHS's Guide to Heritage Tourism in Ontario. Our full-colour Heritage Day poster saluting Ontario's military heritage was distributed to all members of The Ontario Historical Society and reproduced in the Saturday Star.

Many heritage organizations experienced a decline in attendance during 2003. Lower attendance revenues. cancelled school programs, and the reluctance of foreign travelers also resulted in lower gift shop sales. To offset this decline the OHS applied for, and received, funding from the Ministry of Culture's Cultural Tourism Marketing Fund (CTMF) to produce a Guide to Heritage Tourism activities and events. Members, heritage partners, and others were invited to advertise their summer events for a nominal fee. As a benefit to our affiliated societies. their first listing was 'free'. Fascinating Ontario, a guide to over 140 heritage attractions, events and organizations was published by the Toronto Star and released the first week of June. The Guide was circulated to more than 2 million readers of the Saturday Star and was also available at participating sites and travel centers across Ontario. Readers were invited to enter a draw to win one of five Ontario getaway prize packages. Over 2,400 entries were received. Our getaway prizewinnerswere: MargaretPalmer, Ivan Church, Cheryl Barned, Estelle Morris and Mr. J. Allmeier.

Participants in our antique identification workshop series learned how to identify 18th and 19th century decorative arts. An antique identification clinic was held on the Friday evening preceding the Saturday workshops. Noted appraiser Janet Carlile presented the first three workshops in the series on glass, silver, and porcelain/pottery. Janet is the Curator/Director of the Amprior and District Museum and has been invited to join the Canadian Antiques Roadshow. Museum advisor Daniel O'Brien joined Janet for the fourth, and final, workshop on antique furniture. Daniel shared his extensive knowledge of historical interiors, furniture and design. Feedback from participants who attended the workshops was extremely positive. Everyone loved the hands-on approach, and the relaxed atmosphere.

The Accessibility Directorate of Ontario, through the Ministry of Citizenship, awarded the OHS a grant in 2004 to produce an Information and Resource Tool Kit designed to make Ontario's heritage and culture accessible to people with disabilities. The Tool Kit is being presented at public information workshops beginning Spring 2005 in Sudbury. Four additional workshops will take place in locations across the province: Fort Frances, Hamilton, Chatham and Ottawa.

On June 14th, Madeleine Meilleur, Minister of Culture, brought forward amendments the *Ontario Heritage Act* for second reading in the Ontario Legislative Assembly. Since the government introduced Bill 60, *An Act to amend the Ontario Heritage Act*, on April 21st, people from across Ontario have expressed how important the proposed legislation would be in safeguarding Ontario's valuable heritage resources. Third reading of this important legislation remains pending.

The Ontario Historical Society Property & Casualty Insurance Program was announced in late fall. This cost-saving program is offered as a benefit to our affiliated societies.

Thoreau MacDonald's Sketches of Rural Ontario

was launched in late fall at the J.E.H. MacDonald House in Thornhill, in partnership with the Society for the Preservation of Historic Thornhill and Heritage Vaughan. *Sketches* features the distinctive black and white drawings of Thoreau MacDonald and the prose of George W.J. Duncan. *Sketches* is available through the OHS and museum and gallery gift shops.

As in years' previous, the OHS hosted, or participated in, a number of special programs and fundraising events and such as Doors Open/Book Sale, Cookbook Caper, the Toronto Postcard Show, Municipal Freedom of Information workshop, etc. Our resources are stretched thin and we could not do as much as we do without the support of our many volunteers and friends. Thank you all for your generosity and kindness.

I would also like to commend the team of dedicated, hardworking staff who strive to serve you, our members, promptly and courteously - Rob, Christina, Carlos, Natasha, and Sheila – and our two summer students, Barton and Sana. Thank you!

Treasurer's Report for the Year Ending December 31, 2004

The year was marked by improvements to internal operating procedures and expanded activities.

2004 was a challenging year. Total income and expenditures were dramatically increased with the funding of two Government of Ontario one-time programs [CTMF and EnAbling Change], in addition to the annual operating grant. The Grants permitted the Society to significantly enhance membership services and the image of the Society throughout the Province. The Statements of Operations for the year ended December 31, 2004 show revenues of \$632,909 compared to \$388,588 for the previous year.

For the year 2004 there is a small deficit of \$12,960 compared to \$26,892 for the previous year. The deficit resulted from the settlement of a wrongful dismissal case. If it had not been for this one time extraordinary expense the Society would not only have operated at a surplus but would have also been able to do more to promote History in Ontario. The Society settled the wrongful dismissal suit mentioned above through mediation rather than through litigation. This was a challenge during the year and was settled satisfactorily with the active efforts of the Executive Director.

All the programs were managed within the funding available.

External auditors were changed at the 2004 annual meeting with the appointment of Browning, Milgram, experts in auditing not-for-profit organizations. They were chosen after the previous auditor indicated that they would not reduce their professional fees and after three competing proposals were considered.

The Audit Committee, which was created in 2003, met on a regular basis and worked to ensure that the financial statements were more detailed, regular, accurate and timely. This enabled the Board of Directors to be better informed. The Committee was strengthened by the recruitment to the Board of Mr. Naresh Khosla, FCA, who brought considerable financial experience to the Committee.

The Audit Committee prepared an Investment Policy Statement which was submitted to the Board and approved. The Committee also led the Annual Business Planning process for 2005, which was marked by increased Board participation and a Plan which envisages a modest surplus for the year.

Looking ahead to 2005 the Society plans to operate on a break-even basis, or even achieve a small surplus, while:

- strengthening the Board's capacity to serve its members through a planning workshop
- initiating a Fund Raising Plan and Program
- continuing to strengthen the Society's financial position and improving financial reporting.


Membership

Communications

2004 was a big year for the OHS communications division. There were several special projects which were above the usual publicity we do – the Heritage Day poster and the four-page heritage tourism supplement in the *Saturday Star* – which gave us full Ontario distribution!

The grant the OHS received from the Cultural Tourism Marketing Fund included a Heritage Day component, and the supplement in the *Toronto Star* newspaper. The supplement included: editorial about the OHS, advertising, a 'getaway' promotion, event listings (one free for affiliates) and photographs. We also had two full page colour ads in the *Toronto Star* — one to promote Heritage Week's military theme and one to promote the supplement and start our contest promotion. There were also three banner ads in the week leading up to the supplement. Overall it was the largest amount of Ontario-wide advertising the OHS has ever enjoyed!

We officially launched our colourful Heritage Day poster at the OHS Heritage Day reception. This poster was compiled and printed in only five short weeks. Posters were mailed to all members in time for Heritage Week and were also distributed to members of Canada's military. Thanks to the many people who let us use their war-related photographs, especially collector Rick Shaver of Brantford, and Success by Design for their assistance with the design and printing. This poster was made possible as part of the grant the OHS received from the Cultural Tourism Marketing Fund. The OHS received many positive comments about the poster.

Heritage Day 2004, our second annual event was a great success. Although it again snowed, that didn't stop a large eclectic crowd from attending. People really enjoyed themselves. In keeping with the military theme, we had a jazz duo, Café

Jazz, playing 1940s jazz hits and costumed re-enactors strolling around the party. The wine was again provided by Joseph's Estate Wines and the catering was beautifully done by Chef Frederick Oh and Eidolon Catering.

The OHS Bulletin, the main communications tool of the OHS published five issues in 2004 (Issues 143 - 147: February, May, Summer, September and December). It continues to enjoy support and interest from the heritage community in all regions of Ontario. Our members regularly send in their event notices, story ideas, photographs, and other information. We attracted a few new advertisers, and many of the "regulars" continued to advertise. Thank you to all the regular contributors: Pat & Chris Raible for their interesting and informative column From the Bookshelf; Marjory Stuart for her popular Cemetery News; and Rob Leverty for the many great photographs of our members' events. 2000 issues of each Bulletin are printed with many being distributed at OHS workshops, programs and events. The newsletter is also posted on our website.

In 2004, with the assistance of Natasha Urlic, we produced many publicity emails in the form of

pdfs, a preferred format by most now. Thank you Natasha for your continued support of publicity emailings and your skill with databases, as well as organizing incoming publicity mail. Many flyers, invitations, and handouts were produced for various events hosted by the OHS. These were emailed, mailed and put on the website. Media releases were issued for a variety of events including: the Annual Book Sale, Heritage Day, Honours & Awards, Cookbook Caper, the four Antique Workshops, and the Sketches book launch. Thanks to Christina Perfetto for her help with mailing lists, addresses and other memberrelated information. Thank you to Carlos Faria for help with publicity packages, mailings, carrying boxes of publications and event set up. Thank you to volunteer Pearl Hui for her help with filing.

Publications in 2004 included the continued sales and promotion of *Ontario Heritage Directory*, and the production and release of George Duncan's book *Thoreau MacDonald's Sketches of Rural Ontario*. This small chapbook-style publication was launched in the fall at the historic J.E.H. MacDonald House in Thornhill.

The OHS website was maintained by student Wasay Rizwan, who spent a great deal of time with the heritage tourism promotion and related information. This promotion gave our website some excellent profile. Thank you Wasay for your skill and efforts in 2004 with the OHS website. Due to his school and other work obligations, 2004 was the last year for Wasay to be our web guru. In late 2004, a new volunteer Webmaster took over. Welcome Lydia Alexander to the position, which she refers to as *Web Curator*. Lydia has done a marvelous job of updating the site and has a real aptitude for web work. I really appreciate her being part of the communications team.

2004 was quite an exciting year for OHS communications!




popular and entertaining topics. Again, as always, we will attempt to satisfy the interests of both constituencies by providing a journal reflecting the profile of our membership.

Museums Committee

Thanks again to the very competent OHS staff, my colleagues on the Board and especially my fellow Committee members. It has been another exciting and satisfying year as the Chair of the Museums Committee. The following is a brief summary of our activities during the year.

A call to the membership for interest in creating a directory of heritage-related fundraising campaigns for promotion through the OHS Bulletin received no response. As a result, no further action on the initiative was taken. A successful workshop on the Municipal Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act was held on May 7, 2004. Committee members also reviewed and commented on drafts of the EnAbling Change Tool Kit being developed by OHS staff in conjunction with the Accessibility Directorate of Ontario, Ministry of Citizenship. In partnership with York Region Public Health, we are now starting to make arrangements for a Safe Food Handler course, to take place sometime this fall, for representatives from museums, heritage sites and historical societies who provide food services.

Our Committee congratulated Minister Meilleur and the Ministry of Culture staff on the early release of the Community Museum Operating Grant cheques also reminding the Minister how critical the continued availability of stable operating funds is to the ongoing success of community museums throughout Ontario and encouraging an increase to the program's overall funding.

In response to a call for input on the revision to the Municipal Act by the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing, the Committee called to Minister Gerretsen's attention the fact that since 1997, museums have been excluded from receiving development charges and requested that the Province commit to developing new revenue-generating tools for municipally owned and operated museums.

With the knowledgeable and talented assistance of my Committee members and OHS staff, as well as the invaluable input of the Society's members, I look forward to continuing our achievements next year to address the needs of the museum community in Ontario.

Education Programs

In 2004, the OHS was invited by both old and new partners to present numerous educational programs across Ontario. The OHS developed a new presentation entitled Preserving Ontario's Natural Heritage which was given in Owen Sound and Sheguiandah. Our partners were the Owen Sound Field Naturalists, the Escarpment Biosphere Conservancy and the Centennial Museum (Manitoulin Island). The Amherst Island Women's Institute invited the OHS to hold a public meeting entitled How Local Citizens Can Preserve and Restore Their Historical Past. The Etobicoke-York Community Preservation Panel (City of Toronto) invited the OHS to present Designation of Cemeteries under the Ontario Heritage Act:Process and Benefits.

There were again requests for oral history workshops which were conducted this year in Goderich and Collingwood. The OHS presented *In Your Own Words?* and our co-sponsors were The Huron County Historical Society, The Huron County Museum, The Old Durham Road Pioneer Cemetery Committee and the Sheffield Park Black History Museum.



The OHS, The Voyageur Heritage Network, and the Northern Ontario Railroad Museum and Heritage Centre (NORMHC) co-sponsored the workshop The Importance of the Railroad in Capreol. The OHS had a book table in the marketplace and was one of the guest speakers at the Ontario Genealogical Society's Seminar 2004 – 3 Rs of Family History.

The OHS began its EnAbling Change Project-Making Ontario's Heritage Accessible To People With Disabilities in partnership the Accessibility Directorate of Ontario, Ministry of Citizenship & Immigration to develop an Information and

Resource Tool Kit on accessibility issues in Ontario. Both the Provincial Steering Committee and the Provincial Advisory Committee for this project were established and held meetings. Various heritage organizations and institutions across Ontario joined a field advisory committee formed by the OHS to review various drafts of the Tool Kit. The OHS also began to develop a series of accessibility workshops to be conducted in 2005.

In May the OHS and Natural Heritage Books held the 1st Annual *Celebration of African-Canadian History in Print* at the John McKenzie House in Willowdale. This was a special event to meet authors, editors and publishers. During the evening guests were inspired by some memorable readings.


The OHS hosted an *Antique Series* of ID clinics and workshops at the John McKenzie House on the following topics: 18th & 19th Century Glass; Silver; Porcelain & Pottery; and Furniture.

The popular OHS workshop *Victorian & Heritage Gardening* was held in Bethany and Belleville. Our two co-sponsors in 2004 for this workshop were the Manvers Township Historical Society and the Friends of Glanmore National Historic Site.

The OHS was invited to conduct various site visits including: the United Empire Loyalist Heritage Centre & Park in Adolphustown to discuss the challenges a not-for-profit charity faces in owning and managing a nationally significant historic site; the Heritage Project for St. Phillips Anglican Church in Etobicoke; the restoration of the historic South Caradoc United Church Community Centre (Mt. Brydges) and the Friends of Wiarton's Historic School to discuss strategies for community-based organizations to preserve and restore historic buildings.


